A few days ago, I was listening to an audiobook as I tended my greenhouse. The author claimed that people should not vote on principle, but on the best policy choices for the most people. I disagree.

The only way we are going to pull ourselves out of this quagmire in our nation is if we dig deep down into our fundamental beliefs and values. In this community, that should be to love God, and to love our neighbors.

Unfortunately, insidious influences in our nation have crept into our communities and what was once barely noticeable day to day is now driving us towards civil war and, perhaps, the very downfall of our nation. It has already led to bloodshed and enslavement.

We are taught to hate public health employees. Masks became political, instead of neighborly. And vaccines? Don't even want to go there! We are also expected to hate Big Pharma, and insurance companies, and scientists of all kinds.

How about police? Should we hate them because they tried to protect our Capitol Building on Jan. 6, 2021, or because they are portrayed as excessively violent and/or racist?

Fundamental to all this hatred, however, is the pervasive view that we should hate our very governments. It has been heartbreaking to see that many Americans now see our own government as the enemy. So much so, that some continue to cheer DOGE as they fire federal employees.

Our neighbors, losing their jobs, and they are the enemies? Which ones? The ones trying to care for poor people? The ones trying to assist taxpayers?
